- 1. List <u>six</u> (6) specific objectives of the Corps of Discovery and briefly explain whether each of the goals was met or not met.
- 2. List the various countries or groups of people that claimed land west of the Mississippi River in 1800.
- 3. Using your completed map, compare it to a political map of the U.S. and list ALL of the modern American states, or parts of states, that were eventually formed out of the land acquired in the Louisiana Purchase.
- 4. President Jefferson's decision to purchase Louisiana from France was very controversial. The Federalist Party argued that the Constitution does not give the President power to negotiate *treaties* with foreign nations. They claimed the Louisiana Purchase was *unconstitutional*. Using Article II, section 2 of the Constitution, explain your opinion of whether Jefferson's actions were right or wrong. Is buying land or making *treaties* a presidential duty or the job of another branch? Provide specific evidence or interpretations from the Constitution to support you conclusion.
- 5. If the Corps of Discovery explored the West in the 21st *century* instead of the first years of the 19th, their reports and communication might have looked much different.
